MARCH SAFETY TIP:

March is Colorectal Cancer Month. Colorectal cancer is the second deadliest cancer in the US, but it is also preventable. Over 150,000 people will receive a diagnosis or colon or rectal cancer, and over 50,000 will die of it.

Colorectal cancer awareness is important because many cases of these cancers are preventable. Screening by colonoscopy can prevent this cancer because precancerous polyps found during the procedure can be removed at the same time. Regular screenings should start at about age 45. Early detection of cancer permits early treatment, which is more likely to be successful. Over 90% of cases of localized cancers are survivable.

Some known risks are:

- Age. The median age at diagnosis is 66, with 78% of new cases are diagnosed at age 55 or older. Yet, about 12% are diagnosed before age 50. (Early checkups may pay off!)
- Sex. Colorectal cancer is more common in men than women.
- Race. More than 50% of cases are found in the Black population.
- Family history. If your family has a history of colorectal cancer, your risk doubles.
- Personal history. Your risk increases if you have had a previous cancer diagnosis, have a high risk of polyps, or have Irritable Bowel Disease.
- Excessive alcohol use.
- Smoking.
- Obesity.

You can reduce your risk of developing colorectal cancer by getting regular medical checkups, to include needed colorectal screening and colonoscopies as needed; the gastroenterologist can detect and remove suspicious polyps. Personally, exercise regularly, watch your diet, and listen to your physician. Oh, and live longer ... your risk decreases after age 70!

MARCH 29TH IS NATIONAL VIETNAM WAR VETERANS DAY
From Febury 1961 to May 1975, more than 3.4 millons Amricans served in support of
U.S. military operations in Vietnam and Southeast Asia. As of 2010, 58,267 names are
now carved in the polished black granite known as the Vietnam Veterans Memorial
Wall, and more than 1,580 service men are Missing In Action.



DID YOU KNOW.....

VIETNAM STATISTICS

A little history most people will never know. Veterans Statistics off the Vietnam Memorial Wall:

- There are 58,267 names now listed on that polished black wall, including those added in 2010.
- The names are arranged in the order in which they were taken from us by date and within each date the names are alphabetized. It is hard to believe it is 62 years since the first casualty.
- The first known casualty was Richard B. Fitzgibbon, of North Weymouth, MA. Listed by the U.S. Department of Defense as having been killed on June 8, 1956. His name is listed on the Wall with that of his son Marine Corps LCpl Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, who was killed on Sept. 7, 1965.
- There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall.
- > 39,996 on the Wall were just 22 or younger.
- > 8,283 were just 19 years old.
- ➤ The largest age group, 33,103 were 18 years old.

- > 12 soldiers on the Wall were 17 years old.
- > 5 soldiers were 16 years old.
- ➤ One soldier, PFC Dan Bullock was 15 years old.
- > 997 soldiers were killed on their first day in Vietnam.
- > 1,448 soldiers were killed on their last day in Vietnam (the day before they were to leave for home).
- > 31 sets of brothers are on the Wall.
- > 31 sets of parents lost two of their sons.
- ➤ 54 soldiers attended Thomas Edison High School in Philadelphia. I wonder why so many from just one high school.
- > 8 women are on the Wall. All nurses.
- ➤ 244 soldiers were awarded the Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War; 153 of them are on the Wall
- ➤ Beallsville, OH with a population of 475 lost 6 of their sons.
- ➤ West Virginia had the highest casualty rate per capita in the nation. There are 711 West Virginians on the Wall.
- The most casualty deaths in a single day were on 31 January, 1968 245 deaths.
- ➤ The most casualty deaths for a single month were May 1968 2,415 casualties were incurred.
- For most Americans who read this they will only see the numbers that the Vietnam War created.
- To those of us who survived the war, and to the families of those who did not return, we see the faces, we feel the pain these numbers created. We are, until we too pass away, haunted with these numbers, because they were our friends, fathers, husbands, wives, son and daughters. There is no noble war, just noble warriors.

VA IMPLEMENTS NEW FLAG DISPLAY POLICY AT FACILITIES

VA has announced a new policy limiting the display of flags at VA facilities, effective immediately. The policy is intended to establish consistency across the department and aligns with longstanding Department of Defense guidelines.

Under the new directive, only specific flags may be publicly displayed or depicted at VA facilities. These include the United States flag, flags of U.S. states and territories, military service flags, VA flags and official flags of U.S. agencies. Additionally, flags representing prisoner of war/missing in action (POW/MIA), Senior Executive Service (SES), military command units and burial flags for honoring Veterans and reservists are permitted.

The policy applies to all VA facilities, including offices, government vehicles, medical centers, common areas and parking lots. However, it does not prohibit the inclusion of unauthorized flags in museum exhibits, state-issued license plates, grave sites, historical displays or works of art, provided they do not imply official endorsement by the department.

This guidance supersedes VA's previous memorandum on displaying flags during Pride Month, issued in May 2024. However, it does not affect existing policies governing national cemeteries.

"All Veterans and VA beneficiaries will always be welcome at all VA facilities to receive the benefits and services they have earned under the law," Secretary of Veterans Affairs Doug Collins said in an email to all employees. "This policy will bring consistency and simplicity to the display of flags throughout the department, ensuring a singular focus on serving the needs of Veterans, their families, caregivers and survivors."

VA's implementation follows similar policies maintained by the Department of Defense since the previous Trump administration and upheld during the Biden administration.

Marine Corps cuts back number of Ospreys in Okinawa



The U.S. Marine Corps scaled back its number of MV-22 Ospreys from 24 to 20 on Okinawa, Japan, in 2024 as part of an overhauling effort for the aircraft, according to a Marine Corps spokesperson.

The change was outlined in the 2025 Marine Aviation Plan, released earlier this month, which noted a reduction in tiltrotor squadrons across the service from 12 to 10 authorized Ospreys in support of a force design initiative. Medium Tiltrotor Squadrons 262 and 265 based at Marine Corps Air Station Futenma, Japan, were among those cut.

"Force Design realignment reflects a comprehensive evaluation of the structure and number of Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadrons to enhance their overall effectiveness and responsiveness," a Marine Corps spokesperson told Military Times.

The plan has not affected training, combat, or humanitarian missions for the squadrons, the spokesperson said.

The Corps' new aviation plan — the service's first such plan in three years — includes efforts to target the Osprey's proprotor gearbox, which Air Force investigators determined was the root cause of a CV-22B Osprey crash in November 2023 off the coast of Japan that that killed eight U.S. airmen. Following the crash, the military grounded Ospreys across the Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force for three months.

"We are pursuing several improvements to the [proprotor gearbox] to enhance aircraft safety and improve component reliability and durability," the plan reads.
